

ODU's History program develops students' knowledge and understanding of the past for its own sake and as an intelligent means of navigating the present and looking ahead to the future. Through a variety of thought-provoking classes, students have the opportunity to explore the past from the perspective of both general knowledge and particular areas of interest – courses in American, Western and non-Western areas comprise the core of the curriculum.

The 3+2 Program is designed to give students the opportunity to earn their bachelor's degree and J.D. in approximately five full-time years of study.

- Small class sizes allow professors to instruct and mentor students on a personal level
- Students spend three academic years in undergraduate-level study.
- During their senior year, students take their frst-year law school courses that meet both their undergraduate elective and law school program requirements at the University of Dayton (when an overall undergrad GPA of 3.0 and an LSAT of one point higher than the UDSL median LSAT in the year of their conditional admission).
- UDSL offers a minimum \$10,000 scholarship per academic year of law school.
- Waiver of all law school application fees.
- Students can select either 3+2 or 3+3 as late as the end of their third year of undergraduate study.
- Students must enter ODU as freshmen, and complete three years of undergraduate study at ODU prior to transferring to UD.

Students pursuing a degree in History will be prepared for a variety of career options, including:

- Business

- Historical organizations
- Museums
- Federal, state and local government
- Public policy and private interest group
- Regional, transnational, and international organizations
- Public defender
- Criminal law
- Corporate law

With the knowledge students gain from their History studies, ODU graduates will be able to:

- Critically evaluate source materials
- Present information in a variety of formats and styles
- · Communicate ideas in text successfully and precisely
- Compare differing viewpoints and interpretations
- Draw inferences and explain complex events
